Jason shared his entrepreneurial journey at the **Southlake Chamber of Commerce** luncheon held at his VariSpace Southlake campus on Thursday, August 22.

He created the adjustable desk in response to his boss, Dan Flaherty, who was experiencing tremendous back pain. When Dan told his doctor that his back hurt whenever he sat down at his desk, she replied with timeless wisdom: Then, just stand up more!

Dan stacked boxes and started working with his own makeshift standing desk. Dan and Jason researched standing desks online and there was no workable solution for less than \$2-3,000.

Over a three-hour period with their industrial designer, Jason and Dan developed the initial concept for what became the Varidesk – a spring-loaded platform that could be ready to work immediately right out of the box and offered a variety of sitting and standing heights.

Truly, necessity WAS the mother of invention!

As the two of them sat together on a flight to China to meet with manufacturers, they shared a copy of the **Wall Street Journal** and read a quote from the **Mayo Clinic** that reaffirmed they were on the right path.

"<u>Sitting is the new smoking</u>." The message confirmed that the two of them were on a God-given path that they needed to pursue.

They noticed the intense readership of the **SkyMall Magazine** among the flyers and decided to invest \$25,000 in the publication. Within three months, SkyMall reported that the Varidesk ad was being torn out of the magazines and flyers bought the desks for themselves and their offices.

Varidesk became the #1-selling item in SkyMall history.

Jason has disrupted the work and home furniture industries. Here are his three keys to creating disruption:

- Disrupt Yourself make yourself uncomfortable
- Build a Disruptive Business
- Prepare for Disruptions

Jason and Dan were named the 2017 Ernst & Young Entrepreneur of the Year and Jason was named D CEO Magazine's 2021 CEO of the Year.

When Jason spoke to us last Thursday, he had just returned from Mary Kay Cosmetics, where his team was unveiling a "Mary Kay Pink" prototype of the Varidesk.

And one more thing: Jason is a skilled artist who creates unique pieces of art and auctions them off to benefit local nonprofits.

Olympics Innovation

This one will shock you. <u>FastCompany.com reports</u> that as Olympic athletes jumped off diving boards and flipped through their artistic water synchronized swimming sports routines in the Paris games, their pool was **heated by a nearby data center**.

The Aquatics Centre, which was built specifically for the 2024 Paris Olympic Games, kept the temperature of its water around 80 degrees thanks to recovered heat from the nearby Equinix data center.

Data centers house servers that generate massive amounts of heat. As a result, the center produces enough heat to accommodate about 1,000 homes. Without a means of capturing and offloading the heat, it would simply be released into the atmosphere.
